






St John Paul II Day

PBS4L

Santa Sophia Catholic College is building a warm, friendly and cooperative learning environment based on the Positive Behaviour Support for Learning (PBS4L) ethos. The school has established its core values of Wisdom, Faith, Hope and Love and is developing its 'culture' with these values at the core of all behavioural expectations.

What is PBS4L?

Positive Behaviour Support for Learning is an evidenced based framework (as opposed to a program) so it will look a bit different in every school setting. This means by implementing it we can make it more relevant to our school community.

The purpose of PBS4L is to develop effective school-wide systems and practices that are informed by data to get more positive outcomes for students both socially and academically. The basic principle behind PBS4L is that behaviour is learnt and therefore can be taught.

It is important to understand that PBS4L is for everyone. It is not just for students with challenging behaviours. Implementing PBS4L at Santa Sophia means that the expectations of behaviour are made very clear to all in the community. These expectations are actively taught, positively reinforced by staff when these behaviours are observed, and corrected and re-taught by staff when problem behaviour arises.

PBS4L is a transparent framework that encourages parent, student and teacher voice. It is a collaborative community effort aimed at encouraging more positive behaviours within our school community to maximise student wellbeing and learning outcomes.

Families are important members of the school's community.

- When schools and families work together toward a common goal of helping children to be successful, it is much more likely to happen.
- Families have valuable insights and information about how their children learn best and what help they need.
- School staff can help families support their children at home in learning and developing academic, social-emotional and behavioural skills.



- PBS4L schools find various ways to update families on a regular basis about their activities, lessons, projects and celebrations. Schools actively communicate with families so they understand and support the PBS4L process.
- Families benefit from learning how to use similar strategies at home for teaching and supporting their children's social and behaviour skills.

How does PBS4L operate?

- Firstly, the school selects and defines the behaviours expected and desired of the students within the school.
- Expected behaviours are taught to students for the differing situations that occur at school.
- Staff monitor the achievement of these expected and desired behaviours.
- Students are recognised and rewarded for achieving these expectations.
- Data is collected, analysed and used as a means for setting future goals and targets.
- Behavioural errors are corrected and supported.
- The implementation and achievement of success will take 3-5 years to be fully embedded into the school's culture.

Santa Sophia has completed the first step in the process outlined above, by identifying its core values and selecting and defining the behavioural expectations. These values and expectations have been summarised in a matrix. Staff and students have worked together to align examples of desired behaviours within each of the four values.


Required Stationary List for Term 4

Learning Reflection

Geography

In Geography this term we have been learning about Place and Liveability. For our project, we worked in groups of three as consultants to the government. We were assigned the task of recommending a suburb or city in Australia to welcome refugees. We wrote a report which showed the location on a map, factors that make the place liveable, strategies to enhance the liveability and some environmentally friendly or charity organisations near our place that can help achieve those strategies.

What I liked about this project was that it tested my ability to use a wider vocabulary and challenged me to think outside the box. I liked how our range of skills and abilities combined to create a successful report.

Some challenges we faced included finding accurate data on trustworthy websites and putting this information into our own words. Our biggest challenge was deciding on a place to welcome the refugees to. This is because my group members all had different opinions on what makes a place liveable but through discussion, we were able to come to an agreement.

I learnt about a range of geographical tools to make our report more convincing. These tools consisted of population pyramids, climate graphs, BOLTSS / maps and coordinates. I learnt how to communicate better with others about ideas and suggestions. I now have a better understanding of how to overcome challenges as a team.
