

Year 7 Camp

In Term 1, our Year 7 students travelled to the Sydney Sports and Recreation Centre in North Narrabeen to develop their leadership skills, communication, resilience, and social relationships.

Among the Australian greenery and damp grounds, students participated in various team building activities, which allowed students to exercise cooperation, collaboration and patience with each other in new situations. The activities required students to build the tallest tower out of crates, balance on a wooden plank as a group, locate the group from one location to another by swinging on a rope and manoeuvre through a maze while wearing blindfolds. Although some groups didn't achieve the physical goal of the task, they accomplished the greater goal of cooperation and group work in various situations.

During the camp, students also had the opportunity to participate in canoeing and the high ropes course, which challenged students to overcome their fears as well as encourage their peers in uneasy situations.

Students gathered their canoes and kayaks and followed the instructor down the creek.





Canoeing activities involved races, switching boats and swimming, which the students found very enjoyable. Students who participated in the high ropes course did so with courage as they overcame different scenarios at large heights. This was a great achievement for all students, especially those with acrophobia (i.e. phobia of heights). Students also participated in the flying fox where they exited the high ropes course and landed safely on the ground via an overhead cable.





On the first night of camp, Year 7 participated in an eventful Games Night facilitated by the venue staff. Group work and team building were the goals of the night, which allowed students to refocus on having safe fun within their school community. As the night progressed, heavy rain, hail, thunderstorms and frequent lightning confined the group in the hall for hours until there was a gap between the lightning strikes for students to travel back to their cabins. Students used this time to further bond and build their friendships through meaningful conversations, laughs and a lot of food!

Body Worlds Vital Exhibition

The excursion to the Body Worlds Vital Exhibition was an incredible opportunity for the Visual Arts students at Santa Sophia to learn about form and the art of the human body. Studies of anatomy have always been an important part of art education. Artists who know how the human body is put together and how its muscles work are better able to portray people in painting, sculpture, and other art forms.

This knowledge is important, even if artists choose to represent the human form in abstract ways. The students had to draw these human bodies in a booklet using the "8 head proportion guide", this related to their current studies of portraiture and the proportions of the face.

The students created fantastic detail in their drawings by drawing from life and overall it was a very successful day!





Miss Magistrado: Science

In Week 9, Year 7 and 8 attended the Body Worlds Exhibition in Town Hall to learn about the human body, health and wellness.

The exhibition served as an entry event to the students' Science project about body systems in Term 3 as students were given the opportunity to view real human bodies, a large arrangement of individual organs, arterial and organ configurations as well as body slices that were preserved through the process of plastination.

Many students found the exhibition to be fascinating as they learned about how the body works as well as how to fight life-threatening diseases, such as cancer and diabetes, while other students found it to be a very uneasy experience. Throughout the exhibition,



students explored each body system and how they work, and students applied their knowledge of human dignity to their encounters with the displays as they were reminded that each specimen once belonged to a human person.



Kindergarten Overview

Kindergarten has had such an amazing term. The children already have a great sense of ownership over the space and we are seeing their individual personalities emerge as they build on their confidence. This term in particular highlights children building self-confidence, sharing common interests, learning new things about each other and forming friendships with others.



We have begun writing and reading groups in Kindergarten and we have seen so much growth this second half of the term. The students have been developing their skills in writing a simple sentence with a capital letter, finger spaces and full stops. The students have thoroughly enjoyed reading groups and the children have engaged in a variety of learning pods such as the farmer's market, iPad, letter, fine motor and story making pod.

The children have been learning about 2D shapes and numbers from 0 to 20 in Mathematics. The children have enjoyed creating their own picture using a variety of 2D shapes and concrete materials and associating 2D shapes with real life objects. The children have also been growing in their confidence in numeracy particularly when rote counting to 20, recognising numbers and playing numeracy games.





The children have immersed themselves in a range of activities during investigation time. The children have been investigating how things move and what things are made of. In all of these activities, the children are gaining valuable experiences in socialising, working as a team, strengthening their fine motor development and challenging their minds.

It is hard to believe that the children have already finished their first term of Kindergarten. School holidays are right around the corner so we hope you have fun these holidays and we look forward to seeing you next term.
